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'Pretty Polly' celebrates local tales

As a part of Pound Heritage Day, Roadside Theater will perform its musical play Pretty Polly May 28 at 7:30 pm at J.W. Adams Elementary School in Pound.

The stories and songs that make this original production were collected in the 1930s by the WPA Writers Project from Polly Branham Johnson who was in her 70s at the time.

Although Roadside member and co-author of the play Ron Short was not vet born at that time, Aunt Polly's stories are a part of his family's memory.
